TO THE

CORINTHIANS.

A.V.

PAUL, an apostle of Jesus Christ by the will of God, and Timothy our brother, unto the church of God which is at Corinth, with all the saints which are in all Achaia:

2 Grace be to you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. 3 Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord

Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God

of all comfort : 4 Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any

trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God.

5 For as the sufferings of Christ abound in us. so our consolation also aboundeth by Christ.
6 And whether we be afflicted, it is for your con-

solation and salvation, which is effectual in the enduring of the same sufferings which we also suffer: or whether we be comforted, it is for your consolation and salvation.

7 And our hope of you is stedfast, knowing, that as ye are partakers of the sufferings, so shall ye be

also of the consolation.

8 For we would not, brethren, have you ignorant of our trouble which came to us in Asia, that we were pressed out of measure, above strength, insomuch that we despaired even of life:

9 But we had the "sentence of death in ourselves

that we should not trust in ourselves, but in God which raiseth the dead:

10 Who delivered us from so great a death, and doth deliver: in whom we trust that he will yet deliver us:

11 Ye also helping together by prayer for us, that for the gift bestowed upon us by the means of many persons thanks may be given by many on our behalf.

12 For our rejoicing is this, the testimony of our conscience, that in simplicity and godly sincerity, not with fleshly wisdom, but by the grace of God, we have had our conversation in the world, and more abundantly to you-ward.

13 For we write none other things unto you, than what ye read or acknowledge; and I trust ye shall

acknowledge even to the end

14 As also ye have acknowledged us in part, that we are your rejoicing, even as ye also are ours in the day of the Lord Jesus.

15 And in this confidence I was minded to come unto you before, that ye might have a second

Denefit: 16 And to pass by you into Macedonis, and to come again out of Macedonia unto you, and of you to be brought on my way toward Judgea.

17 When I therefore was thus minded, did I use lightness? or the things that I purpose, do I purpose according to the flesh, that with me there

should be yea yea, and nay nay?
18 But as God is true, our word toward you

was not yes and nay. 19 For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, who was preached among you by us, even by me and Silvanus and Timotheus, was not yea and nay, but

in him was yea.

20 For all the promises of God in him are yea, and in him Amen, unto the glory of God by us.

PAUL, an apostle of Christ Jesus through the will of God, and Timothy 1 our brother, unto the church of God which is at Corinth, with all the saints which are in the 2 whole of Achaia: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God 4 of all comfort; who comforteth us in all our affliction, that we may be able to comfort them that are in any affliction, through the comfort

wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God. 5 For as the sufferings of Christ abound unto

us, even so our comfort also aboundeth through 6 Christ. But whether we be afflicted, it is for your comfort and salvation; or whether we be comforted, it is for your comfort, which worketh in the patient enduring of the same suffer-rings which we also suffer: and our hope for you is stedfast; knowing that, as ye are par-takers of the sufferings, so also are ye of the

8 comfort. For we would not have you ignorant, brethren, concerning our affliction which befell

us in Asia, that we were weighed down exceedingly, beyond our power, insomuch that we 9 despaired even of life: 2 yes, we ourselves have had the sanswer of death within ourselves,

that we should not trust in ourselves, but in 10 God which raiseth the dead: who delivered us out of so great a death, and will deliver: on whom we have *set our hope that he will

11 also still deliver us; ye also helping together on our behalf by your supplication; that, for the gift bestowed upon us by means of many, thanks may be given by many persons on our behalf.

For our glorying is this, the testimony of our conscience, that in holiness and sincerity of God, not in fleshly wisdom but in the grace of God, we behaved ourselves in the world, and

13 more abundantly to you ward. For we write none other things unto you, than what ye read or even acknowledge, and I hope ye will ac-14 knowledge unto the end: as also ye did ac-knowledge us in part, that we are your glory-ing, even as ye also are ours, in the day of our

Lord Jesus.

And in this confidence I was minded to come before unto you, that ye might have a 16 second 5 benefit; and by you to pass into Macedonia, and again from Macedonia to come unto you, and of you to be set forward

17 on my journey unto Judea. When I therefore was thus minded, did I shew fickleness? or the things that I purpose, do I purpose according to the flesh, that with me there

18 should be the yea yea and the nay nay? But as God is faithful, our word toward you is not 19 yea and nay. For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, who was preached among you by us, even by me and Silvanus and Timothy, was 20 not yea and nay, but in him is yea. For how many soever be the promises of God, in him

is the yea: wherefore also through him is the Amen, unto the glory of God through us.

21 Now he which stablisheth us with you in Christ, and hath anointed us, is God;

22 Who hath also sealed us, and given the earnest of the Spirit in our hearts.

23 Moreover I call God for a record upon my soul, that to spare you I came not as yet unto

Cornth. 24 Not for that we have dominion over your faith, but are helpers of your joy: for by faith ye stand.

2 But I determined this with myself, that I would not come again to you in heaviness.

2 For if I make you sorry, who is he then that maketh me glad, but the same which is made

sorry by me? 3 And I wrote this same unto you, lest, when I came, I should have sorrow from them of whom

to ought to rejoice; having confidence in you all, that my joy is the joy of you all.

4 For out of much affliction and anguish of heart

I wrote unto you with many tears; not that ye should be grieved, but that ye might know the love which I have more abundantly unto you.

5 But if any have caused grief, he hath not grieved me, but in part: that I may not overcharge

you all.

6 Sufficient to such a man is this "punishment,

which was inflicted of many.

7 So that contrariwise ye ought rather to forgive him, and comfort him, lest perhaps such a one should be swallowed up with overmuch sorrow.

8 Wherefore I beseech you that ye would confirm your love toward him.

9 For to this end also did I write, that I might know the proof of you, whether ye be obedient in all things.

10 To whom ye forgive any thing, I forgive also: for if I forgave any thing, to whom I forgave it, for your sakes forgave I it in the person

of Christ: 11 Lest Satan should get an advantage of us: for we are not ignorant of his devices.

12 Furthermore, when I came to Troas to preach Christ's gospel, and a door was opened unto me of the Lord.

13 I had no rest in my spirit, because I found not Titus my brother: but taking my leave of them, I went from thence into Macedonia.

14 Now thanks be unto God, which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of his knowledge by us in every place.

15 For we are unto God a sweet savour of Christ, in them that are saved, and in them that perish:

16 To the one we are the savour of death unto death; and to the other the savour of life unto life. And who is sufficient for these things?

17 For we are not as many, which | corrupt the word of God: but as of sincerity, but as of God, in the sight of God speak we in Christ.

3 Do we begin again to commend ourselves? or need we, as some others, epistles of com-mendation to you, or letters of commendation from you?

2 Ye are our epistle written in our hearts, known and read of all men:

3 Forasmuch as ye are manifestly declared to be the epistle of Christ ministered by us, written not with ink, but with the Spirit of the living God; not in tables of stone, but in fleshy tables of the heart.

4 And such trust have we through Christ to God-ward:

5 Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think any thing as of ourselves; but our sufficiency is of God;

6 Who also hath made us able ministers of the new testament; not of the letter, but of the spirit; for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life.
7 But if the ministration of death, written and 21 Now he that stablisheth us with you 1 in 1 22 Christ, and anomted us, is God; 2 who also sealed us, and gave us the earnest of the Spirit in our hearts.

But I call God for a witness upon my soul, that to spare you I forbare to come unto 24 Corinth. Not that we have lordship over

your faith, but are helpers of your joy: for 2 by 3 faith ye stand. 4 But I determined this for myself, that I would not come again to you

2 with sorrow. For if I make you sorry, who then is he that maketh me glad, but he that 3 is made sorry by me? And I wrote this very thing, lest, when I came, I should have sorrow from them of whom I ought to rejoice; having

confidence in you all, that my joy is the joy of 4 you all. For out of much affliction and anguish of heart I wrote unto you with many tears; not that ye should be made sorry, but that ye might know the love which I have more abundantly unto vou.

But if any hath caused sorrow, he hath caused sorrow, not to me, but in part (that I press 6 not too heavily) to you all. Sufficient to such a one is this punishment which was inflicted 7 by 5 the many; so that contrariwise ye should ⁶rather forgive him and comfort him, lest by any means such a one should be swallowed up

8 with his overmuch sorrow. Wherefore I beseech you to confirm your love toward him.

9 For to this end also did I write, that I might know the proof of you, 7 whether ye are obe-

10 dient in all things. But to whom ye forgive anything, I forgive also: for what I also have forgiven, if I have forgiven anything, for your sakes have I forgiven it in the person of

11 Christ; that no advantage may be gained over us by Satan: for we are not ignorant of his devices.

Now when I came to Troas for the gospel of Christ, and when a door was opened unto 13 me in the Lord, I had no relief for my spirit, because I found not Titus my brother: but taking my leave of them, I went forth into

14 Macedonia. But thanks be unto God, which always leadeth us in triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest through us the savour of his 15 knowledge in every place. For we are a sweet savour of Christ unto God, in them that are

being saved, and in them that are perishing; 16 to the one a savour from death unto death: to the other a savour from life unto life. And

17 who is sufficient for these things? For we are not as the many, o corrupting the word of God: but as of sincerity, but as of God, in the sight of God, speak we in Christ.

Are we beginning again to commend ourselves? or need we, as do some, epistles of 2 commendation to you or from you? Ye are our epistle, written in our hearts, known and 3 read of all men: being made manifest that ye are an epistle of Christ, ministered by us, written not with ink, but with the Spirit of the living God; not in tables of stone, but in 4 tables that are hearts of flesh. And such cou-

fidence have we through Christ to God-ward: 5 not that we are sufficient of ourselves, to account anything as from ourselves; but our

6 sufficiency is from God; who also made us sufficient as ministers of a new 10 covenant; not of the letter, but of the spirit: for the 7 letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life. But if the ministration of death, 11 written, and R.V.

212 engraven in stones, was glorious, so that the children of Israel could not stedfastly behold the A. V. face of Moses for the glory of his countenance; which glory was to be done away: 8 How shall not the ministration of the spirit be rather glorious? eousness exceed in glory.

9 For if the ministration of condemnation be glory, much more doth the munistration of right-

10 For even that which was made glorious had no glory in this respect, by reason of the glory that excelleth. 11 For if that which is done away was glorious,

much more that which remaineth is glorious. 12 Seeing then that we have such hope, we use

great | plainness of speech:

13 And not as Moses, which put a vail over his face, that the children of Israel could not stedfastly look to the end of that which is abolished: 14 But their minds were blinded: for until this

day remaineth the same vail untaken away in the reading of the old testament; which vail is done away in Christ.

15 But even unto this day, when Moses is read, the vail is upon their heart.

16 Nevertheless when it shall turn to the Lord. the vail shall be taken away.

17 Now the Lord is that Spirit: and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty.

18 But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as "by the Spirit of the Lord.

Therefore seeing we have this ministry, as

we have received mercy, we faint not;
2 But have renounced the hidden things of † dishonesty, not walking in craftiness, nor handling the word of God deceitfully; but by mani-

festation of the truth commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God. 3 But if our gospel be hid, it is hid to them that

are lost: 4 In whom the god of this world hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them.

5 For we preach not ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord; and ourselves your servants for Jesus' sake.

6 For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

7 But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us.

8 We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed; we are perplexed, but not in despair;
9 Persecuted, but not forsaken; cast down, but not destroyed; 10 Always bearing about in the body the dying

of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body.

11 For we which live are alway delivered unto

death for Jesus' sake, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our mortal flesh. 12 So then death worketh in us, but life in you.

13 We having the same spirit of faith, according as it is written, "I believed, and therefore have I spoken; we also believe, and therefore speak;

14 Knowing that he which raised up the Lord Jesus shall raise up us also by Jesus, and shall present us with you. 15 For all things are for your sakes, that the abundant grace might through the thanksgiving

of many redound to the glory of God.

16 For which cause we faint not; but though our

engraven on stones, came 1 with glory, so that the children of Israel could not look stedfastly upon the face of Moses for the glory of his 8 face; which glory 2 was passing away: how

shall not rather the ministration of the spirit 9 be with glory? 3 For if the ministration of

condemnation is glory, much rather doth the ministration of righteousness exceed in glory. 10 For verily that which hath been made glorious

hath not been made glorious in this respect, 11 by reason of the glory that surpasseth. For if that which a passeth away was 5 with glory,

much more that which remaineth is in glory. Having therefore such a hope, we use great 13 boldness of speech, and are not as Moses, who

put a veil upon his face, that the children of Israel should not look stedfastly on the end 14 of that which 2 was passing away: but their

7 minds were hardened: for until this very day at the reading of the old 8 covenant the same veil 9 remaineth unlifted; which veil is 15 done away in Christ. But unto this day, when-

soever Moses is read, a veil lieth upon their 16 heart. But whensoever 10 it shall turn to the 17 Lord, the veil is taken away. Now the Lord

is the Spirit: and where the Spirit of the Lord 18 is, there is liberty. But we all, with unveiled

face 11 reflecting as a mirror the glory of the Lord, are transformed into the same image from glory to glory, even as from 12 the Lord

the Spirit. 4 Therefore seeing we have this ministry, even 2 as we obtained mercy, we faint not: but we have renounced the hidden things of shame, not walking in craftiness, nor handling the word of God deceitfully; but by the manifestation of the truth commending ourselves to

17 For our light affliction, which is but for a

moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and

eternal weight of glory;

18 While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal.

5 For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with # hands, eternal in the heavens.

2 For in this we groan, earnestly desiring to be clothed upon with our house which is from

heaven: 3 If so be that being clothed we shall not be found naked.

4 For we that are in this tabernacle do groan, being burdened: not for that we would be un-clothed, but clothed upon, that mortality might be swallowed up of life.

5 Now he that hath wrought us for the selfsame thing is God, who also hath given unto us the

carnest of the Spirit.

6 Therefore we are always confident, knowing that, whilst we are at home in the body, we are absent from the Lord:

7 (For we walk by faith, not by sight:)

8 We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with

9 Wherefore we | labour, that, whether present

or absent, we may be accepted of him.

10 For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad.

11 Knowing therefore the terror of the Lord, we persuade men; but we are made manifest unto God; and I trust also are made manifest m

your consciences.

12 For we commend not ourselves again unto you, but give you occasion to glory on our behalf, that ye may have somewhat to answer them which glory in appearance, and not in heart.

13 For whether we be beside ourselves, it is to God: or whether we be sober, it is for your

14 For the love of Christ constraineth us; because we thus judge, that if one died for all, then

were all dead:
15 And that he died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto him which died for them, and rose

16 Wherefore henceforth know we no man after the flesh: yea, though we have known Christ after the flesh, yet now henceforth know we him

no more. 17 Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: *old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new.

18 And all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to

us the ministry of reconciliation;

19 To wit, that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them; and hath t committed unto us the word of reconciliation.

20 Now then we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: we pray you

in Christ's stead, \(\pm\) be ye reconciled to God.

21 For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him.

outward man is decaying, yet our inward man 17 is renewed day by day. For our light affliction, which is for the moment, worketh for us more and more exceedingly an eternal weight

18 of glory; while we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal.

For we know that if the earthly house of our 1 tabernacle be dissolved, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, 2 eternal, in the heavens. For verily in this we groan, longing to be clothed upon with our 3 habitation which is from heaven: if so be that being clothed we shall not be found 4 naked. For indeed we that are in this 1 tabernacle do groan, 2 being burdened; not for that we would be unclothed, but that we would be clothed upon, that what is mortal may be 5 swallowed up of life. Now he that wrought us for this very thing is God, who gave unto 6 us the earnest of the Spirit. Being therefore always of good courage, and knowing that, whilst we are at home in the body, we are 7 absent from the Lord (for we walk by faith, 8 not by ³ sight); we are of good courage, I say, and are willing rather to be absent from the

body, and to be at home with the Lord. 9 Wherefore also we *make it our aim, whether at home or absent, to be well-pleasing unto

10 him. For we must all be made manifest before the judgement-seat of Christ; that each one may receive the things done bm the body, according to what he hath done, whether it be

good or bad.

11 Knowing therefore the fear of the Lord, we persuade men, but we are made manifest unto God; and I hope that we are made manifest 12 also in your consciences. We are not again commending ourselves unto you, but speak as giving you occasion of glorying on our behalf, that ye may have wherewith to answer them that glory in appearance, and not in heart.

13 For whether we care beside ourselves, it is unto God; or whether we are of sober mind, 14 it is unto you. For the love of Christ con-

straineth us; because we thus judge, that one 15 died for all, therefore all died; and he died for all, that they which live should no longer

live unto themselves, but unto him who for 16 their sakes died and rose again. Wherefore we henceforth know no man after the flesh: even though we have known Christ after the flesh, yet now we know him so no more.

17 Wherefore if any man is in Christ, 7 he is a new creature: the old things are passed away;

18 behold, they are become new. But all things are of God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and gave unto us the minis-

19 try of reconciliation; to wit, that God was in Christ reconciling the world unto himself, not reckoning unto them their trespasses, and having 8 committed unto us the word of reconciliation.

We are ambassadors therefore on behalf of Christ, as though God were intreating by us: we beseech you on behalf of Christ, be ye

21 reconciled to God. Him who knew no sin he made to be sin on our behalf; that we might become the righteousness of God in him. 6 And working together with him we intreat also

that ye receive not the grace of God in vain

3 Giving no offence in any thing, that the minis-

try be not blamed:

4 But in all things tapproving ourselves as the ministers of God, in much patience, in afflictions, in necessities, in distresses, 5 In stripes, in imprisonments, "in tumults, in

labours, in watchings, in fastings;

6 By pureness, by knowledge, by longsuffering,

by kindness, by the Holy Ghost, by love unfeigned,

7 By the word of truth, by the power of God by the armour of righteousness on the right hand and on the left.

8 By honour and dishonour, by evil report and

good report: as deceivers, and yet true;
9 As unknown, and yet well known; as dying,

and, behold, we live; as chastened, and not killed; 10 As sorrowful, yet alway rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing all things.

11 O ye Corinthians, our mouth is open unto you, our heart is enlarged.

12 Ye are not straitened in us, but ye are strait-

ened in your own bowels.

13 Now for a recompence in the same, (I speak as unto my children,) be ye also enlarged.

14 Be ye not unequally yoked together with

unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness?

15 And what concord hath Christ with Belial? or what part hath he that believeth with an infidel? 16 And what agreement hath the temple of God with idols? for ye are the temple of the living God; as God hath said, "I will dwell in them, and walk in them; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people.

17 *Wherefore come out from among them, and

be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the

unclean thing; and I will receive you,

18 'And will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty.

7 Having therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God.

2 Receive us; we have wronged no man, we have corrupted no man, we have defrauded no man.

3 I speak not this to condemn you: for I have said before, that ye are in our hearts to die and live with you.

4 Great is my boldness of speech toward you, great is my glorying of you: I am filled with comfort, I am exceeding joyful in all our tribulation.

5 For, when we were come into Macedonia, our flesh had no rest, but we were troubled on every side; without were fightings, within were fears.

6 Nevertheless God, that comforteth those that are cast down, comforted us by the coming of Titus;

7 And not by his coming only, but by the consolation wherewith he was comforted in you, when he told us your earnest desire, your mourning, your fervent mind toward me; so that I rejoiced the more.

8 For though I made you sorry with a letter, I do not repent, though I did repent: for I perceive that the same epistle hath made you sorry, though it were but for a season.

9 Now I rejoice, not that ye were made sorry, but that ye sorrowed to repentance: for ye were made sorry after a godly manner, that ye might receive damage by us in nothing.

10 For godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of: but the sorrow of the world worketh death.

2 (for he saith,

At an acceptable time I hearkened unto thee, And in a day of salvation did I succour thee:

behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, 3 now is the day of salvation): giving no occasion of stumbling m anything, that our 4 ministration be not blamed; but in everything commending ourselves, as ministers of God, in much patience, in afflictions, in necessities,

5 in distresses, in stripes, in imprisonments, in tumults, in labours, in watchings, in fastings;

timints, in labours, in waterings, in strings; 6 in pureness, in knowledge, in longsuffering, in kindness, in the ¹Holy Ghost, in love un7 feigned, in the word of truth, in the power of God; ²by the armour of righteousness on

8 the right hand and on the left, by glory and dishonour, by evil report and good report;

9 as deceivers, and yet true; as unknown, and yet well known; as dying, and behold, we 10 live; as chastened, and not killed; as sorrowful, yet alway rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing all things.

Our mouth is open unto you, O Corinthians, 12 our heart is enlarged. Ye are not straitened in us, but ye are straitened in your own affec-

13 tions. Now for a recompense in like kind (I speak as unto my children), be ye also enlarged.

Be not unequally yoked with unbelievers: for what fellowship have righteousness and iniquity? or what communion hath light with 15 darkness? And what concord hath Christ with

³Belial? or what portion hath a believer with 16 an unbeliever? And what agreement hath a temple of God with idols? for we are a temple of the living God; even as God said, I will dwell in them, and walk in them; and I will be their God, and they shall be my

17 people. Wherefore Come ye out from among them, and be ye separate.

And I will receive you 18 And will be to you a Father,

And ye shall be to me sons and daughters, 7 saith the Lord Almighty. Having therefore

these promises, beloved, let us cleanse our-selves from all defilement of flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God.

⁵Open your hearts to us: we wronged no man, we corrupted no man, we took advan-

3 tage of no man. I say it not to condemn you: for I have said before, that ye are in our hearts to die together and live together. 4 Great is my boldness of speech toward you,

great is my glorying on your behalf: I am filled with comfort, I overflow with joy in all our affliction.

For even when we were come into Macedonia, our flesh had no relief, but we were afflicted on every side; without were fightings, 6 within were fears. Nevertheless he that com-

forteth the lowly, even God, comforted us by 7 the 6 coming of Titus; and not by his 6 coming only, but also by the comfort wherewith he was comforted in you, while he told us your

longing, your mourning, your zeal for me; 8 so that I rejoiced yet more. For though I made you sorry with my epistle, I do not regret it, though I did regret; 7 for I see that that epistle made you sorry, though but for a 9 season. Now I rejoice, not that ye were made

sorry, but that ye were made sorry unto repentance: for ye were made sorry after a godly sort, that ye might suffer loss by us in nothing.

10 For godly sorrow worketh repentance sunto salvation, a repentance which bringeth no regret: but the sorrow of the world worketh death. B.V.

11 For behold this selfsame thing, that ye sorrowed after a godly sort, what carefulness it wrought in you, yea, what clearing of yourselves, yea, what indignation, yea, what fear, yea, what vehement desire, yea, what zeal, yea, what revenge! In all things ye have approved yourselves to be clear in this matter.

12 Wherefore, though I wrote unto you, I did it not for his cause that had done the wrong, nor for his cause that suffered wrong, but that our care for you in the sight of God might appear

unto you.

13 Therefore we were comforted in your comfort: yea, and exceedingly the more joyed we for the joy of Titus, because his spirit was refreshed by

you all. 14 For if I have boasted any thing to him of you, I am not ashamed; but as we spake all things to

you in truth, even so our boasting, which I made before Titus, is found a truth.

15 And his † inward affection is more abundant toward you, whilst he remembereth the obedience of you all, how with fear and trembling ye receiv-

ed him. 16 I rejoice therefore that I have confidence in you in all things.

8 Moreover, brethren, we do you to wit of the grace of God bestowed on the churches of Macedonia:

2 How that in a great trial of affliction the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality.

3 For to their power, I bear record, yea, and beyond their power they were willing of themselves;
4 Praying us with much intreaty that we would receive the gift, and take upon us the fellowship of the ministering to the saints.

5 And this they did, not as we hoped, but first gave their own selves to the Lord, and unto us by

the will of God.

6 Insomuch that we desired Titus, that as he had begun, so he would also finish in you the same grace also.

7 Therefore, as ye abound in every thing, in faith, and utterance, and knowledge, and in all diligence, and in your love to us, see that ye abound in this grace also.

8 I speak not by commandment, but by occasion of the forwardness of others, and to prove the

sincerity of your love.

9 For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich.

10 And herein I give my advice: for this is expedient for you, who have begun before, not only to do, but also to be + forward a year ago.

11 Now therefore perform the doing of it; that as there was a readiness to will, so there may be a performance also out of that which ye have.

12 For if there be first a willing mind, it is accepted according to that a man hath, and not according to that he hath not.

13 For I mean not that other men be eased, and

ye burdened:

14 But by an equality, that now at this time your abundance may be a supply for their want, that their abundance also may be a supply for your want: that there may be equality:

15 As it is written, "He that had gathered much had nothing over; and he that had gathered little

had no lack.

16 But thanks be to God, which put the same earnest care into the heart of Titus for you.

17 For indeed he accepted the exhortation; but being more forward, of his own accord he went

unto you.

18 And we have sent with him the brother, whose praise is in the gospel throughout all the churches;

11 For behold, this selfsame thing, that ye were made sorry after a godly sort, what earnest care it wrought in you, yea, what clearing of yourselves, yea, what indignation, yea, what fear, yea, what longing, yea, what zeal, yea, what avenging! In everything ye approved your-

12 selves to be pure in the matter. So although I wrote unto you, I wrote not for his cause that did the wrong, nor for his cause that suffered the wrong, but that your earnest care for us might be made mamfest unto you in the sight

13 of God. Therefore we have been comforted: and in our comfort we joyed the more exceedingly for the joy of Titus, because his spirit

14 hath been refreshed by you all. For if in anything I have gloried to him on your behalf, I was not put to shame; but as we spake all things to you in truth, so our glorying also, which I made before Titus, was found to be 15 truth. And his inward affection is more abun-

dantly toward you, whilst he remembereth the obedience of you all, how with fear and trem-

16 bling ye received him. I rejoice that in everything I am of good courage concerning you. Moreover, brethren, we make known to you

the grace of God which hath been given in 2 the churches of Macedonia; how that in much proof of affliction the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded unto the 3 riches of their 1 liberality. For according to their power, I bear witness, yea and beyond

their power, they gave of their own accord, 4 beseeching us with much intreaty in regard of this grace and the fellowship in the minis-

5 tering to the saints: and this, not as we had hoped, but first they gave their own selves to the Lord, and to us by the will of God. 6 Insomuch that we exhorted Titus, that as he

had made a beginning before, so he would 7 also complete in you this grace also. But as ye abound in everything, in faith, and utterance, and knowledge, and in all earnestness, and in 2 your love to us, see that ye abound

8 in this grace also. I speak not by way of commandment, but as proving through the earnestness of others the sincerity also of your

9 love. For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through 10 his poverty might become rich. And herein I

give my judgement: for this is expedient for you, who were the first to make a beginning a year ago, not only to do, but also to will. 11 But now complete the doing also; that as

there was the readiness to will, so there may be the completion also out of your ability. 12 For if the readiness is there, it is acceptable

according as a man hath, not according as he 13 hath not. For I say not this, that others may

14 be eased, and ye distressed: but by equality; your abundance being a supply at this present time for their want, that their abundance also may become a supply for your want; that

15 there may be equality: as it is written, He that gathered much had nothing over; and he that gathered little had no lack.

But thanks be to God, which putteth the same earnest care for you into the heart of Titus. 17 For indeed he accepted our exhortation; but

being himself very earnest, he went forth unto 18 you of his own accord. And we have sent together with him the brother whose praise in the gospel is spread through all the churches;

6 And having in a readmess to revenge all disobedience, when your obedience is fulfilled.

7 Do ye look on things after the outward appearance? If any man trust to himself that he is Christ's, let him of himself think this again, that, as he is Christ's, even so are we Christ's.

8 For though I should boast somewhat more of our authority, which the Lord bath given us for edification, and not for your destruction, I should not be ashamed:

9 That I may not seem as if I would terrify you by letters.

10 For his letters, say they, are weighty and powerful; but his bodily presence is weak, and his speech contemptible.

11 Let such an one think this, that, such as we are in word by letters when we are absent, such will we be also in deed when we are present.

12 For we dare not make ourselves of the number, or compare ourselves with some that commend themselves: but they measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, "are not wise.

13 But we will not boast of things without our measure, but according to the measure of the "rule which God hath distributed to us, a measure to reach even unto you.

14 For we stretch not ourselves beyond our measure, as though we reached not unto you: for we are come as far as to you also in preaching the

gospel of Christ: 15 Not boasting of things without our measure, that is, of other men's labours; but having hope, when your faith is increased, that we shall be enlarged by you according to our rule abun-

dantly, 16 To preach the gospel in the regions beyond you, and not to boast in another man's "line of things made ready to our hand. 17 But he that glorieth, let him glory in the

Lord. 18 For not he that commendeth himself is ap-

proved, but whom the Lord commendeth.

11 Would to God ye could bear with me a little

in my folly: and indeed "bear with me. 2 For I am jealous over you with godly jealousy: for I have espoused you to one husband, that I

may present you as a chaste virgin to Christ. 3 But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtilty, so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ.

4 For if he that cometh preacheth another Jesus, whom we have not preached, or if ye receive another spirit, which ye have not received, or another gospel, which ye have not accepted, ye might well bear with him.

5 For I suppose I was not a whit behind the

very chiefest apostles. 6 But though I be rude in speech, yet not in knowledge; but we have been throughly made

manifest among you in all things. Have I committed an offence in abasing myself that ye might be exalted, because I have preached to you the gospel of God freely?

8 I robbed other churches, taking wages of them,

9 And when I was present with you, and wanted, I was chargeable to no man: for that which was lacking to me the brethren which came from Macedonia supplied: and in all things I have kept my-self from being burdensome unto you, and so will

I keep myself. 10 As the truth of Christ is in me, tno man shall stop me of this boasting in the regions of

Achaia.

5 casting down 1 imaginations, and every high thing that is exalted against the knowledge of God, and bringing every thought into cap-

5 For I reckon that I am not a whit behind 6 9 the very chiefest apostles. But though I be rude in speech, yet am I not in knowledge; nay, in everything we have made it manifest

7 among all men to you-ward. Or did I commit a sin in abasing myself that ye might be exalted, because I preached to you the gospel of 8 God for nought? I robbed other churches, tak-

ing wages of them that I might minister unto 9 you; and when I was present with you and was in want, I was not a burden on any man; for the brethren, when they came from Macedonia, supplied the measure of my want; and

in everything I kept myself from being burden-

10 some unto you, and so will I keep myself. As the truth of Christ is in me, no man shall stop me of this glorying in the regions of Achaia.

7 And lest I should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a *thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I should be exalted above measure.

8 For this thing I besought the Lord thrice, that it might depart from me.

9 And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmties, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.

10 Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake: for when I am weak,

then am I strong.

11 I am become a fool in glorying; ye have compelled me: for I ought to have been commended of you: for in nothing am I belind the very chiefest apostles, though I be nothing.
12 Truly the signs of an apostle were wrought

among you in all patience, in signs, and wonders,

and mighty deeds.

13 For what is it wherein ye were inferior to other churches, except it be that I myself was not burdensome to you? forgive me this wrong.

14 Behold, the third time I am ready to come to you; and I will not be burdensome to you: for I seek not yours, but you: for the children ought not to lay up for the parents, but the parents for the children.

15 And I will very gladly spend and be spent for tyou; though the more abundantly I love you, the less I be loved.

16 But be it so, I did not burden you: nevertheless, being crafty, I caught you with gule.

17 Did I make a gain of you by any of them

whom I sent unto you?

18 I desired Titus, and with him I sent a brother. Did Titus make a gain of you? walked we not in the same spirit? walked we not in the same steps? 19 Again, think ye that we excuse ourselves unto you? we speak before God in Christ: but we do all

things, dearly beloved, for your edifying.

20 For I fear, lest, when I come, I shall not find you such as I would, and that I shall be found unto you such as ye would not: lest there be debates, envyings, wraths, strifes, backbitings, whisperings,

swellings, tumults:

21 And lest, when I come again, my God will humble me among you, and that I shall bewail many which have sinued already, and have not repented of the uncleanness and fornication and lasciviousness which they have committed.

13 This is the third time I am coming to you. In the mouth of two or three witnesses shall every

word be established.

2 I told you before, and foretell you, as if I were present, the second time; and being absent now I write to them which heretofore have sinned, and to all other, that, if I come again, I will not spare:

3 Since ye seek a proof of Christ speaking in me, which to you-ward is not weak, but is mighty in

4 For though he was crucified through weakness, yet he liveth by the power of God. For we also are weak "in him, but we shall live with him by the power of God toward you.

5 Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves. Know ye not your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you, except ye be reprobates?

6 But I trust that ye shall know that we are not

reprobates. 7 Now I pray to God that ye do no evil; not that we should appear approved, but that ye should do that which is bonest, though we be as reprobates.

forbear, lest any man should account of me above that which he seeth me to be, or heareth from me. And by reason of the exceeding greatness of the revelations—wherefore, that I should not be exalted overmuch, there was given to me a 'thorn in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to buffet me, that I should

8 not be exalted overmuch. Concerning this thing I besought the Lord thrice, that it 9 might depart from me. And he hath said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my power is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my weaknesses, that the strength of Christ may

10 2 rest upon me. Wherefore I take pleasure in weaknesses, in injuries, in necessities, in persecutions, m distresses, for Christ's sake:

for when I am weak, then am I strong.

I am become foolish: ye compelled me; for I ought to have been commended of you: for 1 ought to have been commended of you: for in nothing was I behind 3the very chiefest 12 apostles, though I am nothing. Truly the signs of an apostle were wrought among you in all patience, by signs and wonders and 13 mighty works. For what is there wherein ye were made inferior to the rest of the chiefest of the chi churches, except it be that I myself was not a burden to you? forgive me this wrong.

Behold, this is the third time I am ready to come to you; and I will not be a burden

to come to you; and I will not be a burden to you for I seek not yours, but you: for the children ought not to lay up for the pa15 rents, but the parents for the children. And I will most gladly spend and be 'spent for your souls. If I love you more abundantly, 16 am I loved the less' But be it so, I did not you have burden to have greatly Leaguely.

'Ye think all this time that we are excusing ourselves unto you. In the sight of God speak we in Christ. But all things, beloved, are for

20 your edifying. For I fear, lest by any means, when I come, I should find you not such as I would, and should myself be found of you such as yo would not; lest by any means there should be strife, jealousy, wraths, factions, backbitings, whisperings, swellings, ⁷tumults; 21 lest, when I come again, my God should humble me before you, and I should mourn

for many of them that have sinned heretofore, and repented not of the uncleanness and fornication and lasciviousness which they com-

mitted.

13 This is the third time I am coming to you. At the mouth of two witnesses or three shall 2 every word be established. I have said 8 be-forehand, and I do say 8 beforehand, 9 as when I was present the second time, so now, being absent, to them that have sumed heretofore, and to all the rest, that, if I come again, I 3 will not spare; seeing that ye seek a proof of Christ that speaketh in me; who to you ward

Christ that speaketh in me; who to you ward 4 is not weak, but is powerful in you; for he was crucified through weakness, yet he liveth through the power of God. For we also are weak 10 in him, but we shall live with him 5 through the power of God toward you. Try your own selves, whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves. Or know ye not as to your own selves, that Jesus Christ

as to your own selves, that Jesus Christ is in you? unless indeed ye be reprobate. 6 But I hope that ye shall know that we are 7 not reprobate. Now we pray to God that ye do no evil; not that we may appear approved, but that ye may do that which is honourable, 11 though we be as reprobate.

GALATIANS.

1 Paul, an apostle, (not of men, neither by man, but by Jesus Christ, and God the Father, who raised him from the dead;)

2 And all the brethren which are with me, unto the churches of Galatia:

3 Grace be to you and peace from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ, 4 Who gave lumself for our sins, that he might deliver us from this present evil world, according to the will of God and our Father:

5 To whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

6 I marvel that ye are so soon removed from him that called you into the grace of Christ unto

another gospel:
7 Which is not another; but there be some that trouble you, and would pervert the gospel of Christ.

8 But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed.

9 As we said before, so say I now again, If any man preach any other gospel unto you than that ye have received, let him be accursed.

10 For do I now persuade men, or God? or do I seek to please men? for if I yet pleased men, I should not be the servant of Christ.

11 But I certify you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached of me is not after man.

12 For I neither received it of man, neither was I taught it, but by the revelation of Jesus Christ.

13 For ye have heard of my conversation in time past in the Jews' religion, how that beyond measure I persecuted the church of God, and wasted it:

15 But when it pleased God, who separated me from my mother's womb, and called me by his

16 To reveal his Son in me, that I might preach him among the heathen; immediately I conferred not with flesh and blood:

17 Neither went I up to Jerusalem to them which were apostles before me; but I went into Arabia, and returned again unto Damascus.

PAUL, an apostle (not from men, neither through 1 man, but through Jesus Christ, and God the Father, who raised him from the 2 dead), and all the brethren which are with 3 me, unto the churches of Galatia: Grace to

you and peace ² from God the Father, and 4 our Lord Jesus Christ, who gave himself for our sins, that he might deliver us out of this

present evil 3 world, according to the will of our God and Father: to whom be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

I marvel that ye are so quickly removing from him that called you in the grace of Christ 7 unto a different gospel; which is not another gospel: only there are some that trouble you,

8 and would pervert the gospel of Christ. But though we, or an angel from heaven, should preach 5 unto you any gospel 6 other than that which we preached unto you, let him be ana-9 thema. As we have said before, so say I now

again, If any man preacheth unto you any gospel other than that which ye received, let 10 him be anathema. For am I now persuading

men, or God? or am I seeking to please men? if I were still pleasing men, I should not be a *servant of Christ. For I make known to you, brethren, as touching the gospel which was preached by

12 me, that it is not after man. For neither did I receive it from 1 man, nor was I taught it, but it came to me through revelation of Jesus

13 Christ. For ye have heard of my manner of life in time past in the Jews' religion, how that beyond measure I persecuted the church 14 of God, and made havock of it: and I advanced

in the Jews' religion beyond many of mine own age 8 among my countrymen, being more exceedingly zealous for the traditions of my

15 fathers. But when it was the good pleasure of God, who separated me, even from my mother's womb, and called me through his grace, 16 to reveal his Son in me, that I might preach

him among the Gentiles; immediately I con17 ferred not with flesh and blood: neither went
I up to Jerusalem to them which were apostles before me: but I went away into Arabia; and again I returned unto Damascus.
